Michelle is a re-emerging artist rediscovering her roots and a passion for textiles. Working locally, she is known for creating hand crafted light shades, facilitating technical textile workshops and community based art projects.

For this exhibition Michelle has created sculptural pieces presented in box-frames reflecting her concerns for the environment and the future for the next generation. Using a combination of pen and ink techniques, mixed media and poetry, the artworks are designed to engage and entertain. *"This is an education on water and the care of water, with the over writing of a pun that we will go the way of the dinosaurs if we don't look after our water"*.

Growing up with practical 'can-do' skills Michelle has all the natural abilities to 'live on the land', which translate beautifully in her art practice. She has the ability to make something out of nothing, working with wire, string, rope and a few tools from the shed. Michelle finds herself gravitating to using all these skills, to create her works, sometimes breaking the rules of what is expected of an artist.

Having a diploma in Fabric Design, Michelle combines all her knowledge and techniques to create unique textiles from scratch, printing and dyeing, using the traditional skills to keep them alive, in her art business 'Exclusive Illuminations'; she also teaches and undertakes workshops to pass on these skills and knowledge.

our water, we will go the way of the dinosaurs.

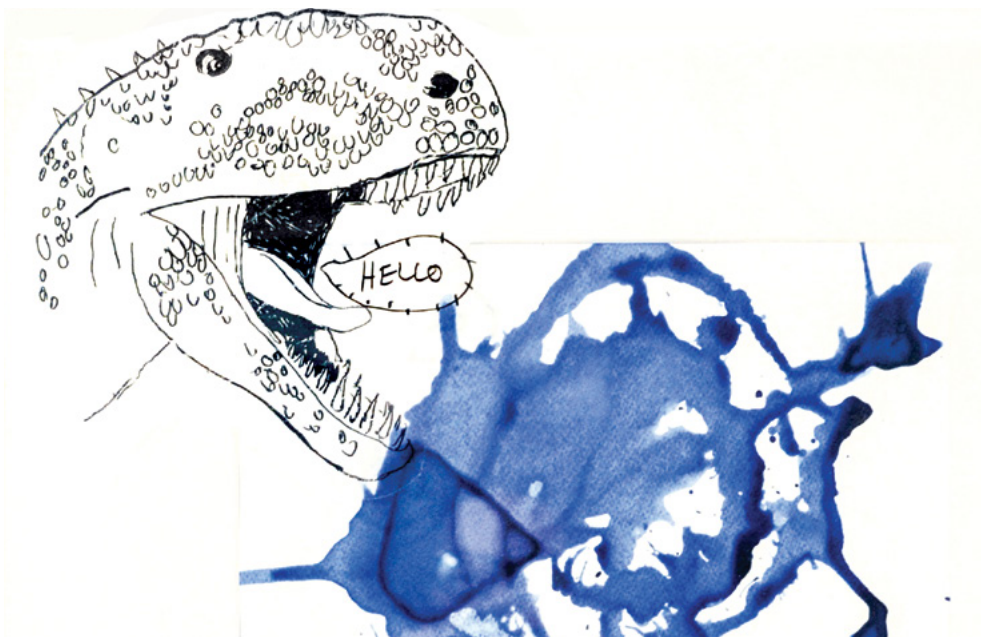
