Steven Glass is a creator of contemporary abstraction working in a range of media including painting, murals and digital imaging. Steven's vast majority of work is based on his synesthetic response to music. This has provided him a rich source of inspiration for extensive research and synesthesia-related projects for over a decade earning him international recognition.

Beginning in 1997, Steven completed studies at a Sydney TAFE while working for an established commercial art studio, painting murals and providing digital imaging solutions. Graduating from UniSA with an honours degree in Visual Art in 2007, his research into abstract painters with sound>colour synesthesia earned him an invitation to the 2008 UK Synesthesia Association academic conference.

The works in this new exhibition '97 'til' are of formalist, geometric abstraction; creating 3-D blocks that link together, balanced in colour and form. Steven has now developed a way of working (whether at mural scale or an A4 drawing) that is driven by more unconscious decisions, rather than the need to achieve a particular final result- "at this point one 'move'

suggests the next, and I feel that the image guides me to its completion more than visa-versa”.

Steven has never been overly interested in reflecting the outside world in his art, but rather the world within. After a decade of representing his own perception of sound, today his work is a reflection of his instinct.

Steven maintains a strong studio practise, as well as actively leading mural and community public art projects around Adelaide. He doesn’t restrict exhibiting his synaesthesia inspired works within conventional galleries and urban murals “I believe colour has powerful therapeutic properties, and I have always sought out venues that make my art more accessible than in the traditional, white wall gallery scenario”.


