

## Feelings with Flowers; Let Them Go

Phoenix Frahm is a self-taught 15 year-old artist based in country South Australia, where he has developed his art practice for the last seven years. Phoenix is extremely skilled in drawing stylised portraits and loves to experiment with semi-realism techniques, specialising in watercolours and pencils and adding symbolic elements within his pieces. He draws inspiration for creating artworks from young Italian artist Elana Rossato and his ever encouraging art teachers at school.

At the beginning of this year, Phoenix was facing difficult challenges with illness and was hospitalised for a short time at the Women's and Children's Hospital. During this time, Phoenix found placidity in art and flowers, creating watercolours from his hospital bed. Phoenix's Play Therapist identified a real talent, and together with the WCH Foundation's Arts in Health coordinator they encouraged and supported him to develop his artworks into an exhibition for the Hospital.

"These pieces highlight each emotion I felt while in hospital, and I carefully researched and chose flowers that reflected those emotions to add into my artworks. In all of my artworks, I have deliberately added insecurities (such as acne, scars, body hair, etc.) in order to show the personality and beauty in being imperfect - as feelings themselves are not always "perfect" or "beautiful".

Making art can assist patients to reduce the stress of being in a hospital environment, providing much needed distraction and a way to make sense of the situation they are in. Through creating these works, Phoenix has been able to document moments in his wellness journey and we can clearly see Phoenix has a bright future in the arts. We are proud to display Phoenix's first solo exhibition, and look forward to watching his art career blossom in the future.
