The abstract paintings are a whole new thing, a joyous celebration of colour, pattern and form that came after a massive creative lull, being playful and painting without an agenda, as a way to get making again."

With over 20 years' experience as a multi-disciplinary artist and educator, Violet's goal is to introduce new ways of looking at things, to amuse, increase awareness and to bring joy.
