

A Portrayal of South Australia by Deb Rooney





Deb Rooney is a self-taught artist from the western suburbs in Adelaide who is known for her contemporary art style which showcases her signature colour and line technique in an illustrative form.

Deb has been fortunate to have travelled far and wide alongside her husband in his work with the Australian Defence Force. As a family, with three children in tow they have been posted to numerous states around Australia and twice to the United States.

It was during a two-year posting in the state of Kansas in 2017-18 where Deb became an 'accidental artist'.

Deb started painting the local scenery, which triggered much interest from her new friends. She was later commissioned to paint scenes around Kansas, which then expanded to paintings of Colorado, beach scenes from Florida, Mississippi, and Hawaii. This unexpected, exciting art journey gave Deb the confidence to continue her unique art practice on return to Australia.

"I feel my art is by virtue, the colours I see and the lines that define them". Deb's art is bold and bright which depicts joyful journeys through the many postings she's encountered thus far.

Deb draws inspiration from female artists in Maud Lewis, Georgia O'Keeffe and Heather Brown who each create their own eclectic style. Deb says she seeks collectors who dare to venture into the bright pop-naïve-contemporary art styles with love and loads of happiness.

Deb created her artworks using mainly acrylic paints and black markers, using small to medium size canvas or acrylic paper. She has always envisaged her art to be different, obscure, animated yet recognisable and hopes to bring that visual flair to this exhibition with creative, meaningful pieces.

For this exhibition at the Women's and Children's Hospital, Deb has selected South Australian pieces that connect to her heart, hoping to bring a dose of gladness, maybe a little nostalgia or simply some loving memories through her creative pieces.
