

## Collecting Life A photo essay by Kirsten Alderson





"Like a shipwreck or a jetty, almost anything that forms a structure in the ocean, whether it is natural or artificial over time, collects life."— Sylvia A. Earle

Kirsten Alderson, an emerging visual artist, finds solace and purpose behind the lens. For many years, photography has been her constant companion, capturing moments and emotions that words often fail to express.

Recently, Kirsten uncovered the true essence of her art: visual storytelling. She chooses not to confine herself to a single category of photography and rejects labels in favour of a broader vision.

Kirsten explains 'Thousands of steps walked along the jetty, countless hours sitting, standing, and simply observing, has confirmed for me that that the jetty really does collect all life — and it's a place where all people come together — rain or shine.

And in these interactions, I've had the pleasure of witnessing the purest moments of the human spirit... and collect these memories on camera. So, what started simply as a series of photos for a photographic assignment, has now, for sure resulted in perhaps a year long quest to capture the jetty from Winter to Spring to Summer and Autumn.'

Kirsten sees herself as a witness to life's experiences, a storyteller through the visual medium.

Over the last 15 years, her work in the not-for-profit sector, especially working with children in palliative care, has profoundly influenced her storytelling. This unique perspective allows her to convey stories authentically and meaningfully. Kirsten documents life (and death) as she sees it, often capturing moments that many overlook.

Kirsten's photographic process is as varied and dynamic as her subjects. She navigates both digital and film mediums. While she appreciates the immediacy and flexibility digital photography offers, she values the tactile nature of film, and the organic quality it imparts to her images. Through her storytelling, Kirsten invites viewers to delve into the intricacies of the human experience, urging them to discover beauty and meaning in even the most ordinary moments, ultimately encouraging pause, reflection, and appreciation.
