

I ME MY MINE An exhibition by Oliver Mills





Meet Oliver Mills; a South Australian artist and poet living with epilepsy, vision impairment and cerebral palsy, a physical condition that affects muscle movement and verbal communication. Using specially designed equipment, and in collaboration with his family, carers, poetry mentors and art mentor, Henry 'Jock' Walker, Oliver creates artworks that offer a visual expression of how he experiences the world.

Oliver's art practice consistently explores mark-making, primarily in two mediums: acrylic paint and charcoal. This exhibition features four charcoal works and four acrylic paintings.

Charcoal is Oliver's preferred medium, as the scritching and scratching sounds, along with the vibration feedback, create a strong sensory connection and excitement with the process. Whereas painting with acrylics allows for greater exploration of colour. Oliver uses specially designed tools as well as direct mark-making with hands and fingers in his process.

He enjoys feeling the canvas surface and experimenting with the varying thicknesses and textures of the paint. Each acrylic work is made up of twelve small canvases, making it practical and accessible for Oliver to create larger works from his wheelchair.

Oliver's artworks have been commissioned for the International Day of People with Disabilities lapel pin, the cover of Westerly Magazine, and by private collectors. His poetry has appeared in the Australian Poetry Journal, The Crow, InDaily, and Growing Up Disabled in Australia. He has received four grants from Arts SA's Richard Llewellyn Deaf and Disability Arts Trust and is currently working on his sixth collection of poems.
